<u>Planning Commission</u>: The Santa Ana Planning Commission consists of seven residents of the city who are appointed by Santa Ana City Councilmembers. The Commission meets regularly on the second and fourth Monday of each month Meetings begin at 5:30 p.m., unless otherwise noted.

The Planning Commission is responsible for providing input to the City Council on long-range planning. Santa Ana's long-range planning goals are embodied in the General Plan. The General Plan and the amendments to it are reviewed by the Planning Commission and adopted by the City Council. The General Plan is implemented through the City's development regulations.

The Planning Commission has the authority to approve or deny applications concerning development within the City. The category of applications includes Tentative Tract Maps, Conditional Use Permits, Minor Exceptions, and Variances. The Planning Commission also makes recommendations to the City Council on all applications for amendments to Zoning and the General Plan.

<u>Agenda and Staff Reports</u> An agenda along with staff reports are provided for each Planning Commission meeting. The Planning Commission agenda and staff reports is posted at least 72 hours prior the meeting on the City's website at <u>www.santa-ana.org/cc/city-meetings</u>, and on the posting boards outside the Civic Center entrance, Council Chamber, and Library. If you have any questions regarding any item of business on the agenda for this meeting, or any of the staff reports or other documentation relating to any agenda item, please contact the Planning and Building Agency at 714-667-2732.

The items on the agenda are arranged in four categories:

- <u>Consent Calendar</u>. These are relatively minor in nature, do not have any outstanding issues or concerns, and do not require a public hearing. All consent calendar items are considered by the Commission as one item and a single vote is taken for their approval, unless an item is pulled from the consent calendar for individual discussion. There is typically no Commission discussion of consent calendar items unless requested.
- <u>Business Items</u>: Items in this category are general in nature and may require Commission action. Public input may be received at the request of the Commission.

- 4. <u>Work Study Session</u>: Items in this category are generally items requiring discussion. No action will be taken.

<u>Public Hearing Procedure:</u> The Planning Commission will follow the following procedure for all items listed as public hearing items:

- 1. The Chair will ask for presentation of the staff report;
- The Commission will have the opportunity to question staff in order to clarify any specific points;
- 3. The public hearing will be opened;
- The applicant/ project representative will be allowed to make a presentation, for a maximum of 15 minutes.
- 5. Members of the audience will be allowed to speak, for a maximum of 3 minutes per speaker.
- The applicant will be given an opportunity to respond to comments made by the audience;
- 7. The public hearing will be closed; and
- Discussion of the proposal will return to the Commission with formal action taken to approve, conditionally approve, deny, or continue review of the application.

<u>Appeals</u>: The formal action by the Planning Commission regarding Conditional Use Permits, Variances, Tentative Tract and Parcel Maps, Minor Exceptions, Site Plan Review, and Public Convenience or Necessity Determinations are final and shall become effective after the ten-day appeal period (unless the City Council in compliance with section 41-643, 41-644 or 41-645 holds a public hearing on the matter, then the formal action will become effective on the day following the hearing and decision by the City Council). An appeal from the decision or requirement of the Planning Commission may be made by any interested party, individual, or group. The appeal must be filed with the Clerk of the Council, accompanied by the required filing fee, and a copy sent to the Planning Department, within ten days of the date of the Commission's action, by 5:00 p.m. If the final day to appeal falls on a City Hall observed holiday or a day when City hall is closed, the final day to appeal shall be extended to the next day City Hall is open for public business. Please note: Under California Government Code Sec. 65009, if you challenge in court any of the matters on this agenda for which a public

hearing is to be conducted, you may be limited to raising only those issues which you (or someone else) raised orally at the public hearing or in written correspondence received by the Planning Commission or City Council at or before the hearing.

## DISCUSSION

The Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) for Santa Ana's Comprehensive General Plan Update has been released for its 45-day public comment review period. The DEIR is intended to inform public decision makers, responsible and trustee agencies, and the general public of the potential environmental effects of the proposed project.

Santa Ana's "Golden City Beyond: A Shared Vision" General Plan is expected to be completed in 2020 and will guide the City's development and conservation for the next 25 years through 2045. The update will provide long-term policy direction and communicate the vision, values, and goals for the City's physical development, fiscal and environmental sustainability, and overall quality of life. The new Santa Ana General Plan will serve to identify areas of opportunity and provide options to enhance development potential in key areas of the city while bringing the City into compliance with recent state laws and reflect updates to current conditions and input from the general public, city staff, and other stakeholders. Santa Ana's General Plan is based on a vision statement and core values established as part of an extensive multi-year community outreach effort, a Technical Advisory Committee, and a General Plan Advisory Group.

The Draft EIR for the General Plan began its public comment and review period on August 3, 2020, with the review period ending on September 16, 2020. The purpose of this hearing is to allow the Planning Commission an opportunity to receive public comments on the potential environmental impacts associated with the proposed plan. The hearing provides the public an additional means to communicate their comments. Responses to the comments received during the public review period will be included in the final EIR.

Based on the current general plan schedule, it is anticipated that the EIR will be presented to the Planning Commission in late September for a recommendation to the City Council. Planning staff will continue to update the Commission on the progress of the project.




### + 1994 Northridge Earthquake

The most recent serious earthquake in couthern California took place in 1994, with an epicenter about 60 miles northwest of Santa Ana. Many roads, including bridges and elevated highways were damaged by the 6.7 magnitude sorthquake. The initial movement lasted upwards of 20 seconds and resulted in the death of 57 people, injuries for over 8,700 people, and over \$20 billion in property damage.

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

# **Master Plan of Arterial Highways**





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# **Comprehensive Program EIR**

**Program EIR –** per CEQA Guidelines Section 15168, a Program EIR,

- Advantages:
  - Use for series of actions that can be characterized as one large project
  - Opportunity for broad policy alternatives and program-wide mitigation measures
  - Comprehensively address cumulative impacts
  - Avoid duplicative consideration of basic policy considerations

### - Use with later activities:

- Future projects may 'tier' off Program EIR may be within scope of EIR or environmental review can be more focused
- Mitigation Measures from Program EIR apply to future projects

# **Project Alternatives**

Alternatives evaluated:

- No Project/Current General Plan -
  - Required by CEQA
  - Assumes there are no changes in comparison to existing General Plan
- Reduced Intensity Alternative
  - Reduces development in 55 Fwy/Dyer Rd and Bristol St. focus areas
  - Reduces housing units by 5,383 units and building SF by 4.2M SF
- 2020 RTP/SCS Consistency Alternative
  - Reduces housing development (-27%) and building SF by (-2%)
  - Reduction of 31,515 housing units 1.7M SF distributed among focus areas & SP/special zoning areas
